t feels almost unexpected that Christmas is already upon us, probably because we enjoyed such brilliant summer weather as short a time ago as October. Thinking back, though, a lot has happened since my June journal.

IN WESTMINSTER

In the past few months, financial troubles deepened in Europe as it became clear that Greece couldn't pay back its debts. The problem is spreading to Italy, Portugal and Spain, which could impact on the UK's economy. Consequently, debate over Europe and shielding ourselves has been a big talking point in the House of Commons.

Some argue that we should spend more. But that doesn't make a lot of sense; the UK hasn't followed Greece's example exactly because the markets are impressed that spending is being reduced and, therefore, satisfied Britain can pay its creditors. Still, economic growth is slow, which is worrying.

Having spoken to local businesses, I realise that tax and red tape are having a stifling effect on operations. So, in October, I asked the Government: "My constituency of Spelthorne is driven by small business. May we have a debate on tax and tax reforms, and their effect on small business?" This hasn't happened yet, but as often in life, you just have to keep pressing; that's exactly what I'll be doing.

As an MP, it's part of my job to encourage the Government to plan ahead. The economic difficulties we face today were caused by wild over-spending. I think that if future governments were compelled to run a balanced budget we could

avoid running into the same problems again. Over the last few months, I've been putting this idea forward in Parliament and in the national press.

LOCAL ISSUES

Back in September, I led an adjournment debate in Westminster on the "Eco Park" development in Shepperton, given the go-ahead by Surrey County Council; I highlighted local hostility to the plan and questioned the degree to which county councils are allowed to overrule popular opinion.

As most residents will be aware, the Secretary of State has chosen not to review the case, which is obviously very disappointing for a lot of people. Nevertheless, there might be other avenues to explore, and I will continue to support residents.

It's been disappointing to hear just recently that Brett Aggregates plan to submit another proposal to dig gravel at Manor Farm in Laleham, after withdrawing their application back in May.

At the time, campaigners did a great job in making their voices heard. It looks like this effort will be needed again, which is disheartening but shows why there's no reason that development can't be halted once more, and for good.

I'm opposed to the proposal, and it's uplifting to see that people are taking the initiative and campaigning already: an attitude that really stands testament to the community spirit, reflected across the local area over the last year. With that thought, I'd like to wish everybody an enjoyable Christmas, a good rest and a Happy New Year.
